In the beginning of their programme, each student is paired with a faculty mentor for individual mentoring, professional advancement, and growth. All of the wards are under the supervision and direction of mentors. Mentors regularly meet with their charges and offer advice on academics, extracurricular, and personal matters. Similar to this, remedial classes and assignments are offered to slow learners, who are also identified and given enough encouragement. Students are encouraged to compete in academic events to win rewards. Encourage students in advanced classes to participate in competitive exams and seminar presentations. The mentors also motivate the students to take part in athletic, NSS, NCC, YRC, RRC, Eco Club, and fine arts events. By fostering social skills and assisting students in thriving in hostile circumstances, mentors serve as role models and promote leadership. The proper application of the mentoring system is reviewed by the department head and principal. Even more, mentors establish a friendly relationship with the mentees parents and work to collaborate with them on their child's progress.
